Enrolling for 2016-2017

Enrollment is now open for the new 4-H year. All youth members and adult leaders participating in 4-H activities at a club or county level should enroll as soon as possible in order to be covered through 4-H insurance. Login to <http://co.4honline.com> and register for the new 4-H year.

The re-enrollment deadline for Adams County 4-H members ages 8-18 is February 1st, new members may enroll in available projects until April 1st. Enrollments not completed by the respective deadlines may be subject to late fees or limited participation. Late fees do not apply to Cloverbud enrollments.

Completing the enrollment process includes two steps: submitting enrollment form using 4hOnline and payment of the annual fee to the Extension Office.

If you are an existing volunteer leader currently working with 4-H youth please enroll as soon as possible in order to be covered through 4-H insurance.

If you are applying to be a leader for the first time please contact Julia so she can help you through the process.

Remember – You must enroll as a leader every year! If you miss enrolling for the year, you must start the entire process over. i.e.: application form, leader training, reference checks and background check.

There are no annual fees for leaders in Adams County 4-H.

The Path to Success

Like anything in life, 4-H has a learning curve – learning what terms mean, when things happen, and what to do. We hope that 2016-2017 in 4-H is a very enjoyable and educational experience for the entire family. The goal of Adams County 4-H is to make 4-H as user friendly as possible. However, we realize that all of the moving parts and project requirements in 4-H may be a little intimidating, so here are some helpful hints to make the next year a little easier.

Stay Informed

The Adams County 4-H office uses several online tools to keep our members and leaders informed. The newsletter is the main method of communication between the Extension Office and the 4-H families. It contains important information about upcoming events, deadlines, activities, workshops, and much more. In addition to this quarterly "QA" newsletter we also offer the Weekly Fourcast e-newsletter. The "Fourcast" can be found at www.adamscountyextension.org/4h/news.htm. You can opt in to have it emailed directly to you on that page. We also post information on Facebook, Twitter & Google Calendar. Even if you do not have social media accounts you can access all of those posts on the 4-H page of our website - www.adamscountyextension.org/4h

Ask Questions

Whether you are a new 4-H family, or have been in the program for years you will have questions from time to time. Ask your leaders, ask other parents and most importantly - feel free to ask the 4-H Staff at the Extension Office. We are here to help you, so don't be afraid to ask your question!

Keep A Calendar

This calendar will serve as the history of what was done in 4-H for each member. Write down events attended, activities participated in, demonstrations, community service activities, and any project related information. This information can help you fill out record books and complete your projects. This will help reduce the stress and anxiety for your family when trying to remember what was done!

Club Participation

Club meetings are an opportunity for your family to meet other 4-H families and to have a support group that will help you learn the ropes of 4-H. Through club meetings, youth learn leadership skills, teamwork skills and make new friends. For parents, the club meetings are a chance for you to learn what you can do to support your children in 4-H. There are several 4-H clubs in Adams County and they all have their own unique personalities. If your current club isn't a good fit don't hesitate to contact another club or the 4-H office to try and find a better fit.

Be Involved

Like anything else, the more you put into 4-H, the more you will get out of 4-H. Take advantage of the workshops, events, and activities that are offered by your club and on the county level. Not only will they help you to understand more about the 4-H program, but they will also open doors to greater opportunities.

Don't Wait Until the Last Minute

Most of the projects in 4-H take months to complete and have different deadlines along the way. Plan to keep projects up to date and be aware of any deadlines. If you are having difficulty contact your leader or 4-H Agent before the deadline approaches so they have time to help you succeed. If you don't make a deadline please understand that your leaders and 4-H Agents cannot change the rules for your family without changing the rules for the entire county. This could mean that you may not be able to participate in a desired project area, so don't wait until it's too late!

A Little Courtesy Goes a Long Way

Be respectful, thoughtful, considerate, cooperative, friendly, and cheerful in your attitude and your behavior regardless of whether you do well or not, or whether you win or lose. Regardless of the outcome thank your parents, volunteers, program organizers, sponsors, judges and others who have helped you.

Survey shows American youth feel today's leaders have a different agenda: *they lack skills to lead themselves*



CHEVY CHASE, MD – As the presidential election hoists leadership to the forefront of national dialogue, a new survey asks America's youth to weigh in on the topic – finding that today's leaders are believed to have their own agendas and demonstrate weak leadership. Additionally, young people would like better preparation as leaders.

Ninety percent (90%) of young people say they are concerned about the future leadership of America, and two-thirds are more confident in the next generation of leaders than in the leaders they see today. This is according to the 4-H National Youth Survey on Leadership conducted online by Harris Poll among 1,501 9th through 12th grade students.

National 4-H Council released the survey findings today at a youth-led rally in Washington, D.C. to kick off the 4-H Grow True Leaders Campaign – giving young people across the country a forum to put their voices into positive action and rally the nation to invest in the next generation of true leaders.

"America is facing a critical need for more leaders – true leaders – who are prepared with the skills to deal with the problems of today and the challenges of tomorrow," said Jennifer Sirangelo, president and CEO, National 4-H Council. "A true leader leads by example, works well with others, tackles tough challenges head-

on and sticks with a job until it's done. This campaign is giving youth a platform to ask for more support in preparing them to lead and to be recognized for their positive contributions."

More than 300 youth gathered at the 4-H Grow True Leaders Rally where they identified specific areas they want more support from adults: hands-on experience in leadership roles, programs to build confidence and regular encouragement to lead. They asked adults to offer positive encouragement of young people by participating in the True Leaders Shout Out online – sharing positive messages and photos or videos using #TrueLeaders to shout out a young true leader who exemplifies a positive example of courage, responsibility and resilience.

Youth also shared action platforms for the issues identified in the survey as most important to America's youth: (1) Access to College; (2) Jobs & The Economy; (3) Bullying; and (4) The Environment. They were joined by Grammy award-winning music artist and 4-H National Spokeswoman Jennifer Nettles and 2016 Miss America Betty Cantrell; both are 4-H alumna. Other notable 4-H alumni are participating in activities and voicing their support of the campaign this week, including CNN host Nancy Grace, Facebook executive Andrew Bosworth, U.S. Congresswoman Terri Sewell, and Weekend TODAY host Craig Melvin. ►

4-H Grow True Leaders: Revitalizing a National Brand

The 4-H Grow True Leaders Campaign is the first of its kind for National 4-H Council – a national, multi-platform initiative that will support the organization’s growth goals of empowering 10 million youth by 2025 (a 67 percent increase).

National 4-H Council partnered with Dailey Advertising to develop creative print, digital and broadcast advertisements as part of the Campaign – featuring powerful images of real 4-H’ers in activities that grow life skills. The marketing charge is to break out of the limited view that many still have of 4-H – to show that the organization is still connected to its roots in agriculture, but has also evolved to feature robust youth development programming in areas like STEM, healthy living and citizenship.

“With impact numbers that are second to none, 4-H has been the best kept secret for far too long,” Sirangelo continued. “We want more people to know that 4-H was founded with youth empowerment at our core, and we are still a youth empowerment organization – with 4-H’ers leading all kinds of positive solutions for the diverse issues our country faces today.



More than 1,500 youth nationwide responded to the survey, which revealed:


- Most youth (81%) think leaders today are more concerned with their own agendas than with achieving the goals of their organizations.
- Seventy-six percent (76%) say leaders are focused on different priorities than what matters most to them.
- Half of youth rate government and political leaders as having weak leadership (51%), among the highest relative to other groups of leaders examined in the survey. Overall, weak leadership is related to not accomplishing what is promised (59%); not working collaboratively (56%); and not offering new solutions (53%).
- Most youth (96%) think leadership is important to addressing the country’s most pressing issues; but only one in three young people says they have the skills they need to be prepared to lead.

Opportunity at the NWSS

They come from Colorado, Kansas, Nebraska and Wyoming to compete in National Western Stock Show's longest running program of practical beef cattle management. In just over 70 years, the Catch-A-Calf Contest has awarded nearly 3,000 steers to 4-H members hailing from the western United States.

The program began in 1935 when 10 boys caught 10 sponsored calves. The contest quickly caught on, and the program grew to include 52 calves by 1942. Soon after World War II, the program settled at 40 calves per year, which is where the number continues to stand today.

The program is designed so successful participants catch a calf, feed it, and return with the animal one year later as a market steer. The market animals are judged on rate of gain, quality of fitting, and carcass quality. The exhibitor is judged on showmanship, their record book, and a personal interview.

Catch-A-Calf contests in the Coliseum are held during the rodeo on Friday, January 13, 2017 (matinee performance), Saturday, January 14, 2017 (matinee performance) and Sunday, January 15, 2017 (matinee & evening performances).

2017 NWSS Catch-A-Calf Applications

This is a great opportunity for all 4-H youth (12 years old by Dec. 31st 2016) interested in the beef project. Participants catch a calf, feed it and return with the animal one year later as a market steer.

Participants must have proper facilities to care for a steer for one year. Participants qualify for over 80 NWSS scholarships!

All about

Catch-A-Calf

The NWSS Catch-A-Calf Program started in 1935 with 10 sponsors and 10 boys who caught calves. Throughout the years, the program became open to both boys and girls and has about 40 participants. This program is available to 4-H and/or FFA members ages 12-18 who catch calves during the performances of the NWSS rodeo each January.

Sponsors

- A monetary donation funds the purchase of a market steer for a 4-H or FFA member to show at the NWSS.
- Half and full sponsorship options are available, depending on the level of contribution a sponsor would like to make. *All donations are tax deductible and allows sponsors to be a part of one of the oldest NWSS traditions.*
- The NWSS currently has over 50 sponsors that range from a variety of businesses, families and former catchers.
- Many sponsors visit their participants throughout the year.

Participants

- The program is designed so successful participants catch a calf, feed it, and return with the animal one year later as a market steer.
 - The market animals are judged on rate of gain, quality of fitting, and carcass quality.
 - The exhibitor is judged on showmanship, their record book, and a personal interview.
- Exhibitors correspond with their sponsors with a written letter at the 1st of every month, keep current and accurate record books all while working and feeding their calves on a daily basis.

Catch-A-Calf participants are qualified for over 80 NWSS Scholarships

The Grand & Reserve Grand Champion Catch-A-Calves are sold in the NWSS Jr. Livestock Auction. A percentage of the proceeds from these two calves goes back to the program and the remaining amount is paid to all qualified Catch-A-Calf participants on a percentage basis.

New Livestock Feed Regulations



Starting January 1, 2017 the Changes Apply to Everyone

Under FDA's Guidance 209, use of medically important antibiotics will be limited to the prevention, treatment or control of a specific disease under a veterinarian's guidance.

Over-the-counter sales of medically important antibiotics will end, including medicated feed and premixes, as well as water-based medications. Access to feed containing antibiotics will only be available by working with your veterinarian who will need to write a veterinary feed directive (VFD). Leftover medicated feed cannot be fed beyond the time line or fed to other animals. Water medications will require a prescription from your veterinarian. As a reminder, medically important antibiotics will no longer be available for growth promotion purposes.

Not the Same Feed

The biggest change for those involved with youth livestock shows will relate to feed.

So, the feed that has always performed well may still carry the same name, but may not include antibiotics as they have in the past. Unless you have a VFD from your veterinarian, you will not be able to purchase any feed or premix with specific antibiotics for disease prevention, control or treatment.

Because a medicated feed purchase will have to match a specific VFD, feed stores may not keep a supply of what you have typically bought before. So, you will have to think ahead, work with your veterinarian and order the appropriate feed before it's immediately needed.

VOLUNTEERS ARE THE HEART OF 4-H

Leader Opportunities in Adams County

Applying for a volunteer position with the 4-H Office in Adams County starts the process of becoming a leader. Applications are submitted through 4-H Online - any person wishing to become a volunteer must enroll in 4-H Online to begin the process. Upon completion of this application, reference checks must be returned to the 4-H office by all references, online trainings completed and a background check completed and approved.



When all these requirements are met, a leader is considered "active" and can act in any of the leadership roles listed below pending any additional requirements specific to the leader position (ie: Shooting Sports).

The types of leaders are:

- Organizational Leader – Responsible for the organization and management of the club.
- Project Leader – An adult who helps 4-H members in their club learn about a specific project.
- Resource Leader – An adult who helps 4-H members countywide with specific projects. The resource leader is not connected to any specific club.
- Shooting Sports Leaders - Resource leaders with additional training specific to Shooting Sports. They direct all countywide Shooting Sports events including practices, shoots and fundraisers
- ADCO 4-H Ambassadors - These leaders are 18-21 years old and typically have been in the 4-H program as a youth member. They help facilitate county-wide 4-H functions and assist new families and members with transition into 4-H.

American AgCredit

The Ag Youth Program provides interest-free loans to purchase and care for livestock projects by FFA and 4-H participants nine years of age or older as of the beginning of the Fair year, and who demonstrate a "C" average or better in school. Project limits for replacement heifers or markets steer's is \$1,500 and \$500 for all other project animals. Each student must keep accurate records available for American Ag Credit to review. At the end of the project, or when the animal is sold, funds must be repaid with full accounting. Brochures and applications to participate in this program are available at the Adams County Extension Office. Applications must be submitted no later than 60 days prior to the applicable fair and a parent and adult Club supervisors must sign as well. SADDLE UP!

The purpose of the 4-H Horse Project is to help youth learn how to properly care for and enjoy your horse while developing Life Skills. Through the 4-H Horse Project, youth can increase their knowledge and improve their horsemanship skills by learning basic safety and handling principles. As a member in the 4-H Horse Project, you will learn about your own horse, other horse breeds, safety, body colors and markings as well as health and care. Youth will also learn about facilities, grooming and training.



Did You Know -

- An average horse will drink 10-12 gallons of water per day.
- A horse eats about 2 percent of its body weight a day for maintenance.
- A 1000 pound horse requires 600 pounds of dry forage each month.
- A horse can see all 4 of its feet.
- A horse needs to have its feet trimmed about every 6-8 weeks.
- A horse's teeth continue to grow throughout its lifetime.
